#### GOLD AWARD

For my Girl Scout Gold Award, I created (and continue to run through a non-profit corporation I formed) a unique multi-faceted educational program called iWitnessed—>iRemember, which reminds my generation – the iGeneration – of the inspirational efforts and sacrifices of the Greatest Generation. This iWitnessed  $\rightarrow$  iRemember Experience ("iWiRe") offers teenagers the once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to learn about World War II directly from WWII veterans, civilians, and concentration camp survivors and to apply those lessons to interactive challenges and service projects that benefit today's U.S. servicemen and servicewomen. This project teaches today's students about the skills and values needed to win the war and re-build the world, and it reminds my generation that history is not someone else's story, but the story of all of us, and what we will give to the future. Already, the iWiRe program has impacted more than 1,000 people, including more than:

- 150 veterans personally honored through iWiRe outreach;
- 350 teen and other participants of iWitnessed-->iRemember exclusive community events, including an event with more than 250 registrants at the Fairfax County Government Center
- 50 attendees of speaking events describing the iWiRe program;
- 200 educators attending the Virginia Commemoration Commission symposium series; and
- 250 persons who met and honored WWII veterans through iWiRe-coordinated events at Reagan National Airport, the World War II Memorial, or the National Memorial Day Parade.

Since I began this project 18 months ago, my iWiRe project has included:

- Investing 50+ hours in personally interviewing 20 eyewitnesses to World War II, people who inspire me and remind me that even teenagers and young adults can change the world.
- Developing four new videos combining these interviews with key facts and lessons from WWII;
- Creating several WWII-themed interactive challenges (including using a special programming language to create two online "escape room" challenges) that today's teens find engaging and interesting;
- Coordinating three service projects making 17 fleece blankets, more than 300 paracord bracelets, and hundreds of thank-you notes for current and retired members of the U.S. military;
- Training teams (including 50-plus teenagers) to assist with iWitnessed iRemember events;
- Organizing and running multiple community events throughout Northern Virginia that feature these videos, escape rooms, service projects, and the chance to meet with WWII veterans;
- Creating a website (iwitnessediremember.jimdo.com) featuring these videos, online escape rooms, and service project instructions for interested individuals or for teachers who want to run similar events in their communities;
- Speaking to groups of students, scouts, and community groups about WWII, the iWiRe project, and how today's latest generation can honor our WWII generation through providing service to our current servicemen and servicewomen;
- Speaking to Honor Flights, Veterans' Day gatherings, Memorial Day ceremonies, and ceremonies at the WWII Memorial
- Partnering with state groups like the Virginia WWI and WWII Commemoration Commission (who distributed 200 copies of the program to history teachers in Virginia), the Profiles of Honor Mobile Museum, Honor Flight Austin, as well as national groups like the Spirit of '45 and the Americans in Wartime Museum; and
- Leading other efforts to honor veterans, including organizing hundreds of teenagers to welcome WWII heroes like the longest working "Rosie the Riveter" (Ms. Elinor Otto) or the pilot who flew the last mission of WWII (Capt. Jerry Yellin), to honor veterans in the National Memorial Day parade, or to provide personalized thank-you notes to several veterans groups.
